## CHECKRIDE

Welcome, fellow Foxers, to our inaugural newsletter. Check in each month for the training topic *du jour*. Do you have questions, pearls of wisdom or topics you'd like to read about? Send me an email and you may just see your ideas gracing the pages of the next newsletter!

Winter is coming. Tired pop culture taglines aside, there's no stopping the relentless march of time. As the temperatures plummet and the arthritis settles in, there comes a glimmer of hope. Our little fleet will perform so well you'll feel like you've climbed aboard a Saturn rocket. Before you enjoy the fruits of density altitude, let's review some hot topics for winter operations.

Heaters are installed in the 172, Archer, and Arrow and will be plugged in when the temps drop below freezing. Also make sure to pop in the cowl plugs and tuck the plane in with the blankies provided to keep the warm air close to the engines. Stay tuned for Cirrus updates and refer to Section 4 of the POH.

Always select your fashion choices with tact. Our onboard heaters work well enough to melt the soles of your boots, but plan your attire as though you will be exposed to the elements for an extended amount of time. Hats, gloves, warm socks, jackets – you know the drill, hardy Chicagoans. Mylar thermal blankets are a toasty and efficient treasure to stow in your flight bag. And don't forget your water; dehydration happens in the winter, too! Thirst is not a reliable indicator of dehydration in cold temps, so stay ahead of the power curve on this one. Water with a small amount of table salt and a squeeze of lemon is a great electrolyte replacement and sugar-free alternative to sports drinks.

And lastly, a quick refresher about the sneaky threat that is carbon monoxide. We all know that our onboard heating systems draw warm air from the muffler and that any aging or cracks can lead to carbon monoxide exposure. Carbon monoxide (CO) is an insidious little (non)stinker that causes anemic hypoxia, or lack of oxygen in the blood. During business as usual, the hemoglobin molecules in your blood will scoop up the oxygen you inhale and hike it on over to your cells. But once you start breathing in exhaust fumes, CO enters the scene. CO is like the hot girl at the party and hemoglobin swoops in, leaving homely little oxygen to dance by herself in the corner. While you're breathing perfectly adequate partial pressures of atmospheric oxygen, it's being replaced by CO in the blood while the cells starve for oxygen and start to flip out. So to wrap up this medical moment, if you smell exhaust or have the heater on and find yourself or your passengers with a raging headache, dizziness, shortness of breath, or confusion, you know what to do: shut off the heater, crack a window, and land safely as soon as practicable.

# DUPAGE AIRPORT PERFORMS FULL-SCALE DISASTER EXERCISE SIMULATED PLANE CRASH TESTS EMERGENCY RESPONSE CAPABILITIES



# HOME BASE

On October 17, 2019, Representatives from more than a dozen local and federal agencies took part in a live emergency exercise of a simulated plane crash Thursday at DuPage Airport (DPA) in West Chicago.

Participants in the emergency preparedness exercise included the West Chicago Fire Protection District, Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), National Transportation Safety Board (NTSB), DuPage County Coroner's Office, Central DuPage Hospital, the Salvation Army and several area police and fire departments.

"We are committed to the safety of our users, employees, neighbors and first responders," said Stephen Davis, Chairman of the DuPage Airport Authority. "This drill provides a great opportunity to work alongside our federal and local agency partners to ensure we are all prepared in the event of an emergency on or near airport property."

The simulation backdrop involved a commercial airliner making an emergency landing at night – the first time DPA has performed a nighttime drill. The exercise was strategically designed to test response protocols, mobilization tactics and coordination among emergency crews with the backdrop of a nighttime crash.

To make the scenario as realistic as possible, officials used a burn prop and school bus to create an airplane fuselage with controlled flames. Crews extinguished the fire, triaged injured passengers and treated and transported numerous victims to local hospitals.

Officials from the DeKalb Airport, the Village of Schaumburg and the DuPage County Office of Homeland Security and Emergency Management observed the drill to evaluate the exercise and provide feedback to participants.

"These live scenarios are a crucial component of our emergency preparation and response training," said Chief Patrick Tanner of the West Chicago Fire Protection District. "Our crews value any opportunity to work alongside local partners and other first responders to prepare for critical incidents that may happen at the airport."

DPA's on-site aircraft rescue and firefighting station is staffed 24/7/365 in order to facilitate a quicker and more efficient response to any potential emergencies. In recent years, the airport has also undertaken runway widening, lengthening and rehabilitation projects that help to ensure the facility can safely accommodate the more than 100,000 flight operations it serves annually.

## ABEAM THE NUMBERS

The club has completed and paid for 2 engine overhauls and 3 ADS-B installations this past fiscal year. As we start the new fiscal year the club has the funds set aside for the overhaul of the engine in N773SP, it will be the 3rd engine with an estimated cost of around \$28,000.

Also, we will complete the installation of the final ADS-B for N700ZG which is scheduled in November. These are the 2 planned major expenditures that will occur in the next few months. Also, we will have the cost of annual inspections coming up after the 1st of the year.

Our insurance renews December 8th. I have begun the process of requesting quotes for insurance from Assured Partners (AOPA), Avemco, and Marsh & McCellan Agency (Our current broker).

Please be advised that the deductible for our airplanes is:

Not in Motion (NIM): \$500

In Motion (IM): \$2000 for Single Engine Fixed Gear

\$5000 for Single Engine Retractable Gear

Each pilot who has the plane logged out for a flight is responsible for the deductible amount if damage occurs while you have possession of the airplane. Some members have a renters policy to cover these deductibles.

I would also like to stress that when using PayPal to pay the club, you need to pay the club as a friend to avoid incurring any fees from PayPal.

#### These are the steps to pay your bill via PayPal without incurring a fee:

- 1. Create your own PayPal account. You will need to verify your email address.
- 2. Link your checking account to your PayPal account.

Note, You will need to link a checking or savings account in order to avoid a fee, if you list a debit card or credit card you will still be charged a fee, it will be added to your payment

- 3. To pay the club without a fee Click on the link on the PayPal login Home page "Pay or Send Money"
- 4. Select Send money to family and friends.
- 5. Then enter: "foxflyingclub@gmail.com" as the account to which you would like to send money.
- 6. You then will be asked to enter the amount to send.
- 7. PayPal will ask you "How want to pay?". This where your registered checking or savings account will be listed. Select one.
- 8. You can add a note to your payment.
- 9. Finally you will need to confirm your payment information.

When using the PayPal app the steps may be different but the key is pay the club as a "Friend or Family" to avoid fees.
